Peter J. King Emergency Care Center at United Hospital now Serving the Community

The new Peter J. King Emergency Care Center at United Hospital opened its doors for business in April. To celebrate this monumental event, United Hospital invited staff, patients, friends and the east metro community to an open house on April 15.

Open house festivities included tours of the facility, presentations by United Hospital leadership, a parade by our emergency medical services partners, food and activities for children.

"Three years ago, we began working toward creating a state-of-the-art emergency medicine facility that the community deserves," said Dan Foley, MD, chief medical officer at United Hospital. "The open house was the perfect way to invite the community to see this new care center, which was designed to increase efficiency and access to timely care, allow for disaster, trauma and bioterrorism response and meet the needs of our growing population."

The new facility features:

- 27 examination rooms
- Six psychiatric rooms to provide a safe and secure treatment area
- 12 observation rooms
- A larger bay that can hold a minimum of six ambulances
- A decontamination area
- An in-department computed tomography (CT) device
- Patient care and family areas designed for greater privacy

Patient Story: Catherine Carey's Close Encounter

What started out as an anniversary celebration became a nightmare for Catherine Carey, a St. Paul resident, when she was bitten by a bat and had to undergo treatment for rabies.

Each autumn, Carey and her husband, Brendan, borrow a friend's cabin in northern Minnesota to celebrate their wedding anniversary. This past year was no exception, and the two headed north in September. Shortly after arriving, a bat flew through the cabin's open door. The Careys left the door open in hopes that the bat would escape. Neither of them saw the bat a few hours later when getting ready for bed, so they assumed it had left.

Carey was almost asleep with her arms wrapped around her pillow when something hit her wrist. She said it felt like "a warm, squishy hamster had been thrown at my wrist."

She turned on the light and saw the bat on the curtains. They were able to finally shoo the bat outside through the balcony doors. Carey examined her wrist, but didn't see anything amiss.

The next day, Carey noticed a bump on her wrist and what looked like two tiny puncture marks. Once home she contacted the Minnesota Department of Health (MDH), and the infectious disease epidemiologist suggested Carey immediately seek treatment in the nearest emergency department. The epidemiologist said that bats rarely fly into people unless they are ill and that she needed prophylactic rabies treatment.

Rabies is a viral disease that is spread through the saliva of rabid (infected) animals. The virus attacks the brain, causing fevers, muscle aches, confusion, agitation, seizures, coma and death. The only treatment is prophylactic; a person must be treated as soon after exposure to an infected animal as possible, before symptoms appear. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) report that the incubation period for rabies, the time from exposure until symptoms appear, can be anywhere from a week to a year in length. However, the sooner preventive treatment is begun the better because once symptoms start the disease is usually fatal.

According to the World Health Organization (WHO), about 55,000 people die from rabies each year. In the United States, thanks to widespread vaccination of domestic animals, only two to three cases of human rabies occur each year. These are usually caused by exposure to nonvaccinated domestic animals or to wild animals, such as bats, raccoons, skunks and foxes, in which the patient does not seek timely treatment. Bat bites are particularly problematic as a bat's teeth are so fine that many do not realize they've been bitten. The CDC recommends that any bat-human contact be followed by rabies treatment. The last case of rabies in Minnesota was in 2007 in a 46-year-old man who did not realize he had been bitten by a bat.

Rabies treatment involves two medications. The first is rabies immune

This is followed by a series of five rabies vaccine injections across 28 days (since Carey's treatment, the Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices has changed the protocol to four rabies vaccine injections across 14 days). According to the CDC "approximately 16,000 to 39,000 persons come in contact with potentially rabid animals and receive rabies postexposure prophylaxis each year" in the United States.

United Hospital and Rabies

The MDH does not keep statistics on the number of people who receive postexposure prophylaxis treatment. They do keep statistics on the number of animals that test positive for rabies in the state. In 2010, 59 animals (skunks, bats, cows, cats and dogs) in Minnesota tested positive for rabies (for more information about rabies in Minnesota, visit www. health.state.mn.us/divs/idepc/diseases/ rabies). United Hospital's records show that about 20 people were treated for rabies prevention at the hospital in 2010.

"The amount of immune globulin needed is based on the patient's weight," said Deb Raptis, director of the United Hospital Emergency Department. "And the immune globulin needs to be administered as close to the site of the animal bite as possible."

Because Carey was bitten on the wrist, which is a narrow, bony area, she could not receive all the immune globulin at once. The nurse had to break it down into a series of 24 shots, spread out over several hours.

"The wrist shots were extremely painful," said Carey. "Immune globulin is thick and burns. But I'm so thankful for the nurse. She was so compassionate and kind." Following this treatment, Carey received her first injection of rabies vaccine and instructions to return in three days for her second injection.

Allergic to the Treatment

Carey's problems were compounded that night when she awoke severely ill. She was having an allergic reaction to the rabies vaccine.

"I thought I was dying," said Carey. "All my internal organs felt like they were packed in ice. I couldn't stop vomiting, and I was dizzy and shaking."

Paramedics were called to help her return to the hospital, where she was immediately treated for anaphylaxis, a life-threatening allergic reaction in which a person's breathing and circulation are compromised.

Carey recovered but she had a problem. She still needed to continue the rabies regimen. For the next four weeks, she had to return to the United Emergency Department for her rabies shots and then to be watched and treated for anaphylaxis.

Through her ordeal, her symptoms were sweating, dizziness, vomiting, nausea, rapid heart rate and, at times, dehydration and confusion, followed by a bleeding ulcer. But Carey attributes her recovery to the staff, nurses and doctors at United.

"I was extremely ill throughout the treatment," said Carey. "It was a horrible situation, but I'm so grateful to be alive and so grateful to live only three blocks from a great hospital like United. They saved my life. More than once."

Previous gifts to the United Hospital Foundation from the Bentson Foundation have funded the Nancy & Larry Bentson Cardiovascular Laboratories in United Hospital's Nasseff Heart Center and neurosurgery suites in the Nasseff Neuroscience Center.

"Neurologic disorders affect millions of Americans and their families," said Laurie Kauth, Larry and Nancy Bentson's daughter. "We are pleased to support the Nasseff Neuroscience Center as it seeks to advance the diagnostic and

Shank has served in many leadership roles at United Hospital, including chair of the department of medicine, chair of the Pharmacy and Therapeutics Committee, secretary-treasurer of the medical staff, vice chief of staff, chief of staff and chair of the Credentials Committee. Since 1996 he has been the medical director of Medicine Services at United Hospital and in 2002 transitioned from his clinic practice to full-time work as a hospitalist at United Hospital. As chair of the Diabetes Management Team, he championed a team effort culminating in United becoming one of the first 10 hospitals nationwide to be awarded the certificate of distinction for inpatient diabetes care by The Joint Commission and the American Diabetes Association.

Dr. Shank's years of service were marked with an unwavering dedication and commitment that was well recognized by his colleagues. He received the 2010 treatment options for patients with neurological diseases.

"It is our sincere hope that many other individuals, foundations and corporations will join us in supporting this extraordinary and innovative center for research and care."

Larry Bentson, who died in April 2009, had a 75-year career in broadcasting, entertainment and communications. He was instrumental in putting what is now KARE-TV on the air in 1953 and later founded what is now Midcontinent Media, a company that provides cable television, digital phone and broadband Internet service in Minnesota and North and South Dakota. Nancy died in 2004. She and Larry were recipients of the 2003 Service to Humanity Award.

Dr. Shank and his wife, Barbara, have been married for 40 years and have two adult children, Kate and Dan. His retirement plans include spending more time with his family, continuing volunteering with the Boy Scouts of America and completing many woodworking projects at his home and cabin.

Operating Room Expansion Project

Patients at United Hospital know when they need surgery, United will provide exceptional care. But this ability is being tested. United's operating rooms are too small and too antiquated for today's, as well as tomorrow's, state-of-the-art technology and capabilities. The fact that our physicians and staff have continued to provide quality, exceptional health care in undersized and limited facilities is a testimony to their knowledge, expertise and dedication.

The majority of United Hospital's operating rooms were remodeled in the late





1970s, before the advent of electronic medical records, portable ultrasound units, image-guided and robotic devices and many other technological advances. Surgeons and staff often find themselves crowded in small operating rooms, high-stepping cables, maneuvering between portable carts and devices and often having to manually shift equipment into and out of the room during procedures. All of which add time, thus incurring additional costs and reducing efficiencies. In an era of reduced reimbursements and increased medical costs, efficient use of the surgical spaces becomes paramount.

The United Hospital Foundation has begun fundraising to expand and improve United's operating rooms. The new design will incorporate larger room size, enhanced lighting and technology and will improve patient flow and use of space.



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In Memoriam: Peter J. King



On March 14, 2011, Peter J. King, a long-time friend and benefactor of United Hospital and St. Paul, died. He was 83 years old.

Although born and raised in Boston, Mass., King made Minnesota his home for more than 40 years. He came to Minnesota in 1971 to work as executive vice president and director of American Hoist and Derrick. He also served as president and director of Pentair and was a major shareholder and director of the Savin Corporation. In 1974, King formed Sunrise International Leasing Corporation, which ultimately became the 50th largest leasing company in the United States. At the time of his death, King was still active in his role as chair of King Capital Corporation, the holding company composed of Sunrise International Leasing Corporation, Sunrise Investments, LLC, and Vanguard Investments, LLC. He also was founder and chair of the Peter J. King Family Foundation, a nonprofit organization whose focus is to provide "brick-and-mortar" facilities to local communities and organizations whose activities are dedicated to the improvement of children's health, education and welfare and the family environment.

It was in the 1970s that King's relationship with the West Seventh community and St. Paul began. Mayor George Latimer and United

Hospital asked King to construct a building in a blighted area that would provide safe housing for hospital staff and local residents and also provide badly needed space for independent medical specialty groups. King constructed the Irvine Park Towers and Fort Road Medical Center. His family foundation also funded two child care facilities and a playground facility for low income housing in the area.

King's legacy is reflected throughout the West Seventh area. As Russell King, son, says, "As a business, we have had a philosophy of investing wisely to get the most benefit

for the buck. We apply this same philosophy to our family foundation. Bricks and mortar provide benefits for thousands of beneficiaries each year that should last at least 50 years."

In 2006 the Peter J. King Family Foundation made the lead gift of \$3.5 million toward the construction of the new home for the Peter J. King Family Health Center. This center, which opened in 2009, houses United Family Medicine, an organization dedicated to providing access to comprehensive primary care regardless of ability to pay.

"In our foundation's work, we always seem to come back to the West Seventh community and its needs. United Family Medicine really fit our foundation's mission perfectly," said Russell King, who serves as president of the family foundation and King Capital Corporation and is a member of the United Hospital Board of Directors.

Another legacy is the new Peter J. King Emergency Care Center, a state-of-the-art emergency medicine facility that opened in April 2011 at United Hospital (see page 3). The facility was named to honor King for the lead gift to the new facility. Shortly before his death, Peter King stated in an interview for this publication, "When I think of United Hospital, I constantly think about its presence and its dedication to the West Seventh neighborhood. United is part of a large health care system, but it is still very much a community hospital. Despite its size, the doctors and staff are compassionate and they are always sensitive to the community's needs."

"When I think of Peter, I think about his commitment, passion and dedication to the people of St. Paul and the community," said Duke Adamski, United Hospital Foundation president. "Over the years, Peter, and now Russell, have recognized the needs of the community and then aggressively found ways to take care of that need. Peter was a wonderful friend to this community and the hospital, and he will be missed."

Peter is survived by his loving companion, Ann Fankhanel, his sons, Bill (Beth) and Russell; his grandsons, Kyle, Ryan and Michael King, William and Daniel Graham, and Kellin and Alex Sandeno. United Breast Center Earns National Certification

The United Hospital Breast Center is a comprehensive program of screening, diagnostic, treatment and support services for women with benign and malignant breast disease. The Breast Center provides quality care from a team of professionals, backed by the latest technology. For an appointment, call the Breast Center at 651-241-8300. The United Hospital Breast Center received three-year full accreditation by the National Accreditation Program for Breast Centers (NAPBC), a program administered by the American College of Surgeons, in November 2010. The Breast Center is one of only three in Minnesota to have earned this distinction.

Accreditation by the NAPBC is only given to those centers that have voluntarily committed to provide the highest level of quality breast care and that undergo a rigorous evaluation process and review of their performance.

"We are proud of the achievement the NAPBC certification represents," said Rosemary Oolman, RN, MA, OCN, patient care manager at the Breast Center. "Particularly gratifying is that the United Hospital Breast Center passed all 27 standards on which the NAPBC evaluates programs. That's a reflection of the outstanding care provided by our staff, and the superior technology and support services we all provide that ensures quality care and screening for patients with breast health concerns or breast cancer."

The NAPBC report on the United Hospital's Breast Center survey congratulated the center for its strong leadership and multidisciplinary program.

During the survey process, the center was required to demonstrate compliance with standards established by the NAPBC for treating women who are diagnosed with the full spectrum of breast disease. The standards include proficiency in the areas of: center leadership, clinical management, research, community outreach, professional education and quality improvement. A breast center that achieves NAPBC accreditation demonstrates a firm commitment to offer its patients every significant advantage in the battle against breast disease.

Supporting Parkinson's Disease and Movement Disorders Research

If you or someone you know has Parkinson's disease you are not alone. According to the National Parkinson Foundation, approximately 50,000-60,000 new cases of Parkinson's disease are diagnosed each year in the United States. Worldwide, nearly 20 million people are affected by this chronic, degenerative neurologic disorder. Since the cause of Parkinson's disease is unknown and there is no cure, research is a critical factor for the continued improvement of its diagnosis and treatment. Some of this vital and exciting research is being conducted right here in the east metro because of support from the United Hospital Foundation and United Hospital Research and Education Committee.

In 2010, Jawad A. Bajwa, MD, medical director of the United Deep Brain Stimulation Program for Movement Disorders began leading a scientific study to research Parkinson's disease, essential tremor, dystonia and other movement disorders in seven east metro area patients. The study, which is a collaboration between United Hospital, Neurological Associates of St. Paul, PA, Capistrant Center for Parkinson's Disease and Movement Disorders and the University of Minnesota, uses magnetoencephalography (MEG) as its primary research method. MEG is a safe, noninvasive and painless procedure that provides information on how a person's brain functions. It can detect small biomagnetic signals

produced by the brain, either spontaneously or in response to stimulation and provides data about the location(s) of brain tissue that produce these signals. This could help scientists to understand abnormal brain mechanisms in disorders like Parkinson's disease, essential tremor and dystonia.

While findings from the 2010 research cannot yet be shared, Dr. Bajwa and his team are working toward publishing articles in peer-reviewed prestigious neurologic journals and also will be presenting posters at some international conferences this year. Also, based on the pilot data, Dr. Bajwa and his team have submitted medical research grants to the National Institutes of Health (NIH) and Dystonia Medical Research Foundation and plan to submit additional NIH grants this year. Even if these grants are awarded, additional funding will be required and is critical for the continuation of this research endeavor over years to come. This may help the scientific community to understand disease like Parkinson's disease better and develop improved drugs and devices for treatment in the future.



Magnetoencephalography is a safe, nonivasive way to map the brain's functions. United Hospital's magneto technology is being used to research Parkinson's disease, as well as other movement disorders to improve diagnosis and treatment.

Enhancing EMS Partnerships

The East Metro experienced an exciting year of growth with its emergency medical services (EMS) partnerships in 2010.

United Hospital saw continuation in the partnership with the city of Burnsville to provide medical direction to the fire department's ambulance service. Joe Madigan, MD, and Larry Erickson, MD, provide physician oversight for the fire department's paramedics.

United also provides medical oversight for the Dakota Communications Center (DCC). The DCC answers all 9-1-1 calls in Dakota County and provides medical screening and advice for those calls involving medical emergencies. Dr. Erickson



serves as medical director to oversee this activity. The training of the dispatcher and ongoing quality improvement are supported by Allina Medical Transportation's dispatch leadership team.

This year also saw the city of Woodbury contract with Allina's Office of EMS for medical direction and continuing education support of the city's paramedics. Paul Satterlee, MD, is the lead medical director and is also supported by Drs. Jay Westwater, Chris Kapsner and Joe Madigan. Other support for Woodbury includes providing medications through United's pharmacy.

These new and continuing partnerships reflect United's growing commitment and influence in supporting EMS providers. Through such partnerships, United helps improve the quality of care provided to patients in emergency situation, as well as the overall health of the communities we serve.

Telling our Story

If you have driven past United Hospital on interstate 35E in recent months chances are you have seen banners promoting our nationally recognized outcomes in stroke and heart care.

Federal Health Care Reform

*The "donut hole" was created in 2003 and affects those enrolled in Medicare who have prescription drug coverage Medicare Part D. In 2011, this means:

- You pay out-of-pocket for monthly Part D premiums all year.
- You pay 100% of your drug costs until you reach the \$310 deductible amount.
- After reaching the deductible, you pay 25% of the cost of your drugs, while Part D pays the rest, until the total you and your plan spend reaches \$2,800.
- Once you reach this limit, you have hit the coverage gap called the "donut hole." You are now responsible for the full cost of your drugs until your total reaches the yearly out-of-pocket spending limit of \$4,550.
- After this yearly spending limit, you are only responsible for a small amount of the cost, usually 5 percent of the cost of your drugs.

Understanding the hundreds of provisions in federal health care reform and knowing which changes will affect you and your family can be a daunting task. Under the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act, the biggest change is that more Americans will have access to health insurance.

In 2014, individuals will be required to have insurance and large employers will be required to provide insurance or both will face a fine. Individual plans can be purchased through new insurance markets and some will qualify for credits to help cover the costs.

Here's a breakdown of some recent and upcoming changes:

As of December 2010:

- Young adults can stay enrolled on their parents' plans until age 26.
- Insurance companies can't take away your coverage if you get sick or cap your lifetime coverage.
- Companies can't deny coverage to children with pre-existing conditions. And a new high-risk plan provides coverage to uninsured adults with pre-existing conditions.
- If you enroll in a plan through work, you receive free preventive care.
- You'll get a \$250 tax rebate if you're enrolled in Medicare Part D and hit the "donut hole."*

In 2011:

- If you're enrolled in Medicare, preventive care including annual wellness checkups will be free.
- If you're in the "donut hole," you'll get half-off brand-name drugs.



Federal health care reform is designed to slowly phase out the "donut hole" clause in Medicare Part D prescription drug coverage that requires those enrolled to pay thousands in drug costs each year.

• You'll no longer be able to pay for over-the-counter drugs not prescribed by a doctor with flexible savings plans or health spending accounts.

In 2014:

- If you don't have health insurance, you'll face tax penalties that increase each year.
- Insurance companies won't be able to deny you coverage or base your premiums on your health status. They also can't cap your yearly coverage.
- If you still don't have coverage through work, you'll be able to buy affordable plans through new state-based insurance exchanges.
- All health coverage must meet new government standards for the benefits it provides.

United Heart & Vascular Clinic Now Serving the East Metro

United Heart & Vascular Clinic (UHVC) is now serving the east metro area of the Twin Cities. Located on the United Hospital campus, UHVC offers a full range of resources for the prevention, early detection, rapid treatment and rehabilitation of heart disease in one integrated, state-of-the-art facility located in downtown St. Paul.

UHVC was established when cardiologists from the now-closed St. Paul Heart Clinic joined Allina Hospitals & Clinics and HealthEast Care System in January 2011. UHVC cardiologists are the same who, throughout the past decade, have been partnering with the Nasseff Heart Center and making it nationally recognized for heart care.

UHVC has additional locations at Allina Medical Clinics in Farmington, Forest Lake and Hastings and at the Apple Valley Medical Center, the Aspen Medical Group – Maplewood clinic and the Baldwin Area Medical Center and River Falls Medical Clinic in Wisconsin.

Allina Launches Community Engagement Program



United Hospital employees volunteered their time and talents to provide a Wellness Fair at the 2010 East Metro Project Homeless Connect, held at the Saint Paul River Centre. Such volunteer activities are part of Allina's commitment to the communities in which we provide health care services.

Throughout the past year, Allina Hospitals & Clinics formalized a deeper, broader community engagement plan for the nine regions in which Allina provides health care services. In the east metro, which includes United Hospital and 21 Aspen and Allina Medical Clinics in Ramsey, Dakota

and Washington counties, community engagement staff will manage a variety of activities focused on supporting employee volunteerism, developing health improvement opportunities for underserved communities, engaging in health care public policy and advocacy and formalizing charitable contributions. The overarching goal in all this work is to foster a culture and reputation as a compassionate, trusted community partner known for health, wellness and excellent health care.

Through extensive research and health needs assessments, Allina discovered recurring themes and ongoing community health challenges around obesity and mental health. As a result, the community engagement program will center on helping members of underserved communities improve their nutrition, increase physical activity and enhance life balance – Healthy, Active Living!

East Metro Community Health Dialogue


United Hospital hosted a community health dialogue at the Wilder Foundation where community leaders, social service providers, public health experts, elected officials, school representatives and others discussed community barriers and assets for achieving good health. They identified opportunities for Allina to support and promote healthful eating, active living, maintaining life balance and generally foster improved community health in the east metro region.

The most commonly cited barriers to community health in the east metro were unequal health care access for low-income individuals and communities of color; the increased influence of technology and "passive" entertainment; ease of access to cheap, unhealthy food; and lack of safe spaces for children to play outdoors, unsupervised. The group also identified adolescents, single adults with children and communities of color as those most negatively impacted by these barriers.

In the coming months Allina's director of community engagement for the east metro, Heather Peterson, along with project coordinator Patty Carlson, will be working with staff at United Hospital and east metro clinics to develop specific strategies and activities within the east metro region that address these important health improvement issues.

TOTAL INCOME



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

NOW IS THE TIME TO ACT

Recent tax legislation extended the Bush tax cuts for two more years as a compromise to dealing with tough economic times. Although some in Congress called for making these cuts permanent, that did not happen. In my experience, no tax legislation will ever be permanent; however, with the extension of the Bush tax cuts and the certainty for estates for the next two years, we should be able to do a better job as it relates to charitable planning in this period of time.

Although charitable planning is often guided or determined by tax laws in effect at the time, we need to consider a number of other elements to truly make a difference. First, medical research is at the forefront of extending and improving the quality of life. Let me say that once more – extending and improving the quality of life. Now, more than at any other point of time, it is important that continued support for medical research occurs. The needs of many require continued financial support from those who can do so.

Second, it is easier to give of ourselves when we have ways to replenish those funds for family members who survive us. The use of charitable trusts and other irrevocable trusts can aid us in our long-term planning.

Third, tax legislation is never static. It will always change, which requires us to deal with the advantages that are present now and to spend less time worrying about the future. In my article in the Fall 2010 United Hospital Foundation newsletter, I noted that carryover basis and better record keeping could become a concern. I also noted that by contributing highly appreciated assets, one might alleviate some of those record keeping concerns.

The recent tax legislation continues to allow for stepping up the basis to date of death for deaths in 2010, 2011 and 2012. Whether it will continue after 2012 will depend upon the efforts of Congress. For gifts of assets prior to death, the basis for the donee is usually the same as it is in the hands of the donor.

Today, there has never been a better time where people who have substantial assets can make a difference in improving quality of life. Through contribution of these assets to qualified charitable organizations, there is virtually no tax when those assets are liquidated, which leaves a greater amount of dollars that can be spent toward medical research. This means that greater benefits during the next two years and beyond exist in contributing highly appreciated assets to either charitable trusts or to donor advised funds, such as those of the United Hospital Foundation. With proper planning we can be certain to maximize tax savings in making those contributions, whether they are current gifts or legacy gifts from a will or trust.

In conclusion, please consider making those gifts now when they can make a greater difference for us, our loved ones, our friends and our community.

The apartments offer a place for families to stay when a loved one is hospitalized. This fund helps subsidize guests who can't afford to pay for the service.

MEDICAL EDUCATION AND RESEARCH ENDOWMENT FUND
